

REGIONAL HIGHLIGHTS



A key part of the marine search and rescue (SAR) system, RCMSAR volunteers operate year-round in one of the most demanding search and rescue areas in the world. RCMSAR's area of operations covers over 25,000 km of coastline in regions known for their challenging weather and sea conditions. We also have presence on inland waters too with a station located in the Shuswap.

Through an agreement with the Canadian Coast Guard our volunteers are called out to marine emergencies by the Joint Rescue Coordination Centre (JRCC) in Victoria, often in collaboration with other emergency responders, local partners and agencies.

RCMSAR also operates from communities where we are the only available marine response assets, filling an important role in the SAR network. Our stations are situated as follows:



NOTABLE MISSION

Pacific Pearl Sinking, March 8, 2020

RCMSAR 45 Crew: Chris Ashurst, Collin Camire, Susanne Koenig and Meredith Adams

At 0930 hrs on Saturday, March 8, RCSMAR 45 Masset were alerted of an Immediate Danger May-Day call of a wooden hull commercial halibut longline fishing vessel taking on water with 5 persons on board. Blowing seas with heavy wind waves, the RCMSAR 45 Tagwaal set out against the strong wind and high tide. After five attempts to set a tow, our volunteers managed to keep the vessel off the rocks near the Mazarredo Islands within seconds of the Pacific Pearl nearly smashing her wooden hull over the reef. On scene to support the rescue were the RCMP and the Prince Rupert Coast Guard, CCGS Macintyre Bay, to assist with pumping. Ultimately, the crew of the Pearl was evacuated saving their lives before the vessel went down. "We released the tow line, marked with a red buoy, and all the action finally stopped. It was a sombre time watching her slip down. We returned minus a lot of gear sacrificed to the effort, and some damage to Tagwaal forward railing, but all the crew from each of the four vessels involved made it safely back to dock." RCMSAR 45 Coxswain, Chris Ashurst.

RCMSAR 33 Oak Bay Crew: Robert Wylie, Charles Justin Stephenson, Peter Johannknecht, Hans Terstappen, Wayne Heth

One Sunday afternoon in April, RCMSAR 33 Oak Bay volunteers concluded training on the water when they heard a Pan-Pan distress call over VHF marine radio. Within five minutes the call for help was upgraded to an Immediate Danger May-Day call. Crew on the Oak Bay Sea Rescue II proceeded towards Cadboro Bay to find three persons on board a disabled, flooded RHIB along with several abandoned Sailing Dinghies on the rocky West shoreline of Flower Islet. While strong onshore wind made communication challenging our volunteers used a messenger line to get the tow line to the RHIB. Once secured, the vessels were pulled off the rocks

and the three persons were taken aboard the Oak Bay Sea Rescue II and wrapped in blankets. All three – two young students who were taking a sailing lesson and their instructor – were in good spirits and were safely delivered to the Royal Victoria Yacht Club docks.

Family of Recreational Boaters May-Day near Lions Gate Bridge, July 19, 2020

After departing Granville Island, the wake of a nearby freighter that had passed minutes earlier quickly began to pummel a family of six recreational boaters. Within minutes their boat was taking on too much water. Wet, scared and bailing water the parents, Martin and Monica, instructed their eldest son

to call for help. The JRCC immediately tasked the nearest RCMSAR station and the Canadian Coast Guard. Fortunately, the crew of RCMSAR 1 Craig Rea Spirit were already on the water and responded within 8 minutes of receiving the May-Day call. When rescued, the family recounts how a RCMSAR volunteer introduced himself as "Santa" as they were being pulled on to the Craig Rea Spirit.

"There was such relief on our children's faces when a RCMSAR volunteer, white beard and all, reached out his hand to retrieve us. When we left the marina that day the only thing on our mind was to enjoy a few hours on the water with our family. You never know when you are going to need help."

The Volunteer of the Year Award acknowledges an individual volunteer who has made an outstanding contribution to their station or the organization.



Not only does Per hold several leadership positions at both the station and with the Gulf Islands Marine Rescue Society, he is also actively involved in SAR operations, training, management and fundraising. At the time of his award, Per conducted 54 search and rescue (SAR) missions with a cumulative 900 hours of sea time and nearly 8,000 hours of on-call time. Per's wise leadership to the station and its members, his personal knowledge and practical expertise in operations and maintenance of marine equipment has made a demonstrable impact to his station and within his community.
